

# Management of Acute Dental Problems During COVID-19 Pandemic

30 March 2020

“Due to the Coronavirus outbreak and in accordance with instructions from Scottish Government and the Chief Dental Officer, only patients with severe symptoms of infection, bleeding or trauma will be seen for emergency dental treatment at the present time. If you are experiencing severe pain you may be asked to take medication for 48hrs and to phone back if symptoms persist.”

According to the Chief Dental Officer’s instructions, dentists should operate on the basis of providing **Advice, Analgesia and Anti-microbials**.

This guide is based on, and aligned with, the SDCEP *Emergency Dental Care and Management of Acute Dental Problems* guidance publications. **It is specifically adapted for NHS GGC and only for use during the COVID-19 pandemic**.

It describes modified management of commonly presenting oral conditions for use during the COVID-19 pandemic. It aims to encourage a consistent approach to the management of acute dental problems, while recognising the challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic presents for provision of dental care.

The management options presented here focus on dental triage, the relief of pain or infection and provision of care using remote consultation (i.e. by telephone or videocall<sup>1</sup>).

Patients should only be referred for urgent dental care when there are severe or uncontrolled symptoms that they cannot manage themselves. It is essential to minimise the number of patients referred to our PDS Special Care Hub both to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 to healthcare workers and patients, and to lessen the pressure on these services.

## General Principles

- Assessment of patients should take account of patient and staff safety, the best interests of the patient, professional judgement, local urgent dental care centre arrangements and prioritisation of the most urgent care needs.
- Primary care dental triage should focus on the provision of the three As:
  - Advice;
  - Analgesia;
  - Antimicrobials (where appropriate).

Patients should be advised that treatment options are severely restricted at this time and to call back in 48-72 hours if their symptoms have not resolved.

- It is advisable to liaise with local pharmacy colleagues to ensure that the products you might be recommending are available to your patients. An example Standard Operating Procedure has been provided separately
- Dental conditions that cannot be managed by the patient and require urgent dental care should be referred via the PDS Special Care Hub Monday-Friday between the hours of 0900-1800 and to NHS24/111 out-with these times
- Appropriate records should be kept of all patient contacts, including care management and onward referrals



The following flowchart and table should be used to inform dental triage for remote provision of advice, analgesics or antimicrobials, or referral for urgent dental care or emergency care if appropriate.

### Triage of Commonly Presenting Dental Problems

The following diagram illustrates a simple method for managing care for patients by telephone triage. Note that this is not comprehensive but deals with the most common presenting symptoms.



\* Severe and uncontrolled pain is pain that cannot be controlled by the patient following self-help advice.

## Common oral conditions likely to present for dental care

The following table outlines the signs and symptoms of oral conditions likely to present by telephone and the severely restricted management options available during the COVID-19 pandemic. Note that this is not comprehensive but deals with the most common presenting conditions.

**Due to self-isolation and shielding policies, patients may have attempted to self-manage symptoms. It is important to establish the patient's self-management to date, including analgesic use, to check for possible overdose.**

In the table below, management can be provided in three ways:

### Advice and Self-help

Mild and moderate symptoms managed remotely by general dental practices providing advice and self-help, which might involve analgesics and antimicrobials.

### Urgent Care

Severe or uncontrolled symptoms that cannot be managed by the patient and require the patient to see a dentist in the PDS Special Care Hub.

### Emergency Care

Emergency conditions that require immediate medical attention.

<p><b>Necrotising ulcerative gingivitis/periodontitis</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain (general or localised)</li> <li>• Swelling</li> <li>• Bleeding gums</li> <li>• Halitosis</li> <li>• Ulcerated gingival tissue</li> <li>• Fever, malaise</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 1167 1461 1464" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Recommend optimal analgesia.</li> <li>• Recommend chlorhexidine or hydrogen peroxide mouthwash.</li> <li>• Give oral hygiene advice (benzylamine mouthwash or spray may make toothbrushing less painful).</li> <li>• Consider antibiotics (metronidazole is drug of first choice).</li> </ul> </div>
<p><b>Reversible pulpitis</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tooth pain - may be intermittent and associated with stimuli</li> <li>• Tooth is not tender to percussion</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 1503 1461 1800" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Recommend optimal analgesia.</li> <li>• If due to a missing filling, advise patient to use an emergency temporary repair kit which can be purchased online or at a pharmacy.</li> <li>• Advise patient to avoid hot and cold food.</li> <li>• Advise patient to call back if symptoms get worse.</li> </ul> </div>

Problem (symptoms)	Management
<p><b>Irreversible pulpitis</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tooth pain - spontaneous and longer lasting (up to several hours) and may keep the patient awake at night</li> <li>• Pain may be difficult to localise to a single tooth, may last for several hours, may be dull and throbbing, may be worsened by heat, but may also be alleviated by cold</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 277 1437 488" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Recommend optimal analgesia.</li> <li>• Advise patient to try rinsing with cold water as this can alleviate pain.</li> <li>• Advise patient to call back if symptoms get worse.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 501 1437 674" style="border: 1px solid orange; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If pain is severe and uncontrollable, preventing sleeping or eating, refer to PDS Special Care Hub for management including possible extraction.</li> </ul> </div>
<p><b>Dentine hypersensitivity</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain (sharp, sudden and short-lived)</li> <li>• Exposed root surface as a result of gingival recession</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 725 1437 936" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Advise patient to:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◦ regularly apply desensitising toothpaste to affected area with finger;</li> <li>◦ avoid stimuli (cold or acidic foods or drinks).</li> </ul> </li> </ul> </div>
<p><b>Dry socket</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain (onset 24-48 hours after extraction; in vicinity of extraction site; tenderness of alveolar socket wall)</li> <li>• Unpleasant taste or odour from affected area</li> <li>• Swelling (occasionally)</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 987 1437 1227" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Recommend optimal analgesia.</li> <li>• Recommend warm saltwater mouthwash.</li> <li>• Do not prescribe antibiotics unless there are signs of spreading infection, systemic infection, or for an immunocompromised patient.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 1240 1437 1391" style="border: 1px solid orange; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If pain is severe and uncontrollable, preventing sleeping or eating, refer to PDS Special Care Hub for dressing.</li> </ul> </div>

Problem (symptoms)	Management
<p><b>Post-extraction haemorrhage</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Bleeding - can be immediate due to failure to secure adequate initial haemostasis, within a few hours (reactionary) or within a week of an extraction (indicative of possible infection).</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 280 1437 815" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Advise patient not to spit or rinse.</li> <li>Advise patient to:                             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>gently rinse the mouth once with warm (not hot) water to wash out excess blood;</li> <li>place a rolled-up piece of cotton or a gauze swab moistened with saline or water over the socket, bite firmly on it and maintain solid and continuous pressure for 20 minutes before checking whether the bleeding has stopped;</li> <li>repeat once if necessary.</li> </ul> </li> <li>After the bleeding has stopped, advise the patient to avoid drinking alcohol, smoking or exercising for 24 hours and to avoid disturbing the blood clot.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 831 1437 958" style="border: 1px solid orange; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-top: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If the bleeding fails to stop, but <b>is not</b> brisk and persistent, discuss with PDS Special Care Hub for management.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 974 1437 1279" style="border: 1px solid red; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-top: 10px;"> <p><b>Emergency care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If the bleeding fails to stop, <b>is</b> brisk and persistent, or the patient is taking anticoagulant medication (e.g. warfarin, aspirin, clopidogrel) or has a congenital bleeding disorder discuss with PDS Special Care Hub between 0900-1800 Monday-Friday.</li> <li><b>Outside normal working hours, pt to contact NHS24/A&amp;E dept as per flow chart</b></li> </ul> </div>

If the patient is receiving drug treatment or has an underlying medical condition that might be the cause of the ulcer(s), advise them to contact their general medical practitioner.</p>
<p><b>Cracked, fractured, loose or displaced tooth fragments and restorations</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain (general and localized; tenderness to bite)</li> <li>• Sensitivity to hot, cold and sweet and chewing of food</li> <li>• Open cavity</li> <li>• Section of tooth or filling missing</li> <li>• Sharp edge on tooth</li> <li>• Mobile section of tooth or teeth</li> <li>• Mobility or loss of restoration</li> <li>• Trauma to the soft tissues of the tongue, lips or cheek from sharp edges of the fracture site</li> <li>• Gingival inflammation</li> <li>• Recurrent caries</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 1391 1453 1525" style="border: 1px solid red; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Emergency care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the patient has <b>inhaled</b> a piece of tooth, filling or restoration, refer for emergency care.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 1541 1453 2049" style="border: 1px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-top: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For broken or fractured teeth or fillings:                             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◦ if tooth is sensitive to hot and cold, advise patient to use an emergency temporary repair kit which can be purchased online or at a pharmacy;</li> <li>◦ recommend optimal analgesia;</li> <li>◦ advise the patient to call back if painful symptoms have not been relieved with optimal analgesia.</li> </ul> </li> <li>• If crowns, bridges and veneers:                             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◦ advise patient to use an emergency temporary repair kit which can be purchased online or at a pharmacy;</li> <li>◦ if patient has painful symptoms, recommend optimal analgesia.</li> </ul> </li> </ul> </div>

<p><b>Ill-fitting or loose dentures</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain (general discomfort, localised)</li> <li>• Difficulty speaking</li> <li>• Difficulty eating</li> </ul>	<p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Recommend optimal analgesia.</li> <li>• Advise the patient to remove their denture whenever possible.</li> <li>• Advise the patient to seek routine dental care when this service resumes.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Trauma from fractured or displaced orthodontic appliances</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain</li> <li>• Soft tissue injury</li> </ul>	<p><b>Emergency care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the patient has <b>inhaled or ingested</b> large parts of a fractured appliance or the airway is compromised, refer for emergency care. N.B. Brackets are frequently swallowed by patients and pass through the bowel without incident.</li> </ul> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Direct the patient to the British Orthodontic Society website (<a href="http://www.bos.org.uk">www.bos.org.uk</a>) for advice on managing other orthodontic problems.</li> </ul>

Problem (symptoms)	Management
<p><b>Dento-alveolar injuries</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Pain</li> <li>• Bleeding</li> <li>• Swelling</li> <li>• Teeth/dentures do not meet together in the way that they did before</li> <li>• Tooth mobility</li> <li>• Paraesthesia</li> <li>• Other problems specific to bone fractures e.g. nose bleeds, diplopia (double vision), loss of visual acuity</li> </ul>	<div data-bbox="683 282 1453 555" style="border: 2px solid red; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p><b>Emergency care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If bleeding is severe and will not stop within 15-30 minutes; there has been significant facial trauma; the patient has had a head injury or loss of consciousness; the patient has inhaled a tooth or tooth fragment, refer immediately for emergency care.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 577 1453 748" style="border: 2px solid yellow; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent Care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If permanent or deciduous teeth are displaced en bloc or dentures no longer meet together following traumatic injury, refer to PDS Special Care Hub for urgent care</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 790 1453 954" style="border: 2px solid yellow; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the bleeding fails to stop, but <b>is not</b> brisk and persistent, refer to PDS Special Care Hub for management.</li> </ul> </div> <div data-bbox="683 996 1453 1370" style="border: 2px solid green; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px;"> <p><b>Advice and self help</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the patient is not in need of emergency medical attention, advise them to:                             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>◦ clean the affected area by rinsing gently with mild antiseptic and if foreign object(s) are present in the mouth, remove them;</li> <li>◦ apply ice packs to soft tissue injury and swelling;</li> <li>◦ apply pressure with a finger to stop any bleeding.</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Consider recommending analgesia. Problem (symptoms)	Management
<p><b>Avulsed, displaced or fractured teeth</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Fracture of tooth or loss of tooth structure</li> <li>• Increased mobility of tooth or several teeth as a unit</li> <li>• Tooth looks displaced or elongated</li> <li>• Teeth do not meet together in the way that they did before</li> <li>• Empty tooth socket</li> </ul>	<p><b>Follow advice for dento-alveolar injuries above and:</b></p> <div data-bbox="683 322 1444 869" style="border: 1px solid orange; border-radius: 15px; padding: 10px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p><b>Urgent care</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If a <b>permanent</b> tooth has been knocked out, advise the patient to:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ handle the tooth by its crown (the white part), avoid touching the root;</li> <li>○ if the tooth is dirty, wash it briefly (10 seconds) under cold running water;</li> <li>○ try to re-implant the tooth in its socket and then bite gently on a handkerchief to hold it in position;</li> <li>○ if this is not feasible, store the tooth for transportation to the designated urgent dental care centre in milk (not water).
